


What are protected () characteristics?

Be informed: The Equality Act



In the UK, **a law** was put in place called **the Equality Act 2010**.

The law was put in place to protect people from discrimination in school, at work, or wherever they go in everyday life.

Discrimination:

The unfair treatment of a person or a group of people because of who they are.



Be informed: The Equality Act



It is everyone's job to make sure that people are treated equally and fairly, and it is the job of the police and the courts to make sure people follow this law.



Be informed: The Equality Act



This law protects people with certain characteristics against discrimination. These nine characteristics are known as protected characteristics.







