A **system** that connects **computers around the world** so people can **share** and **talk** with each other.

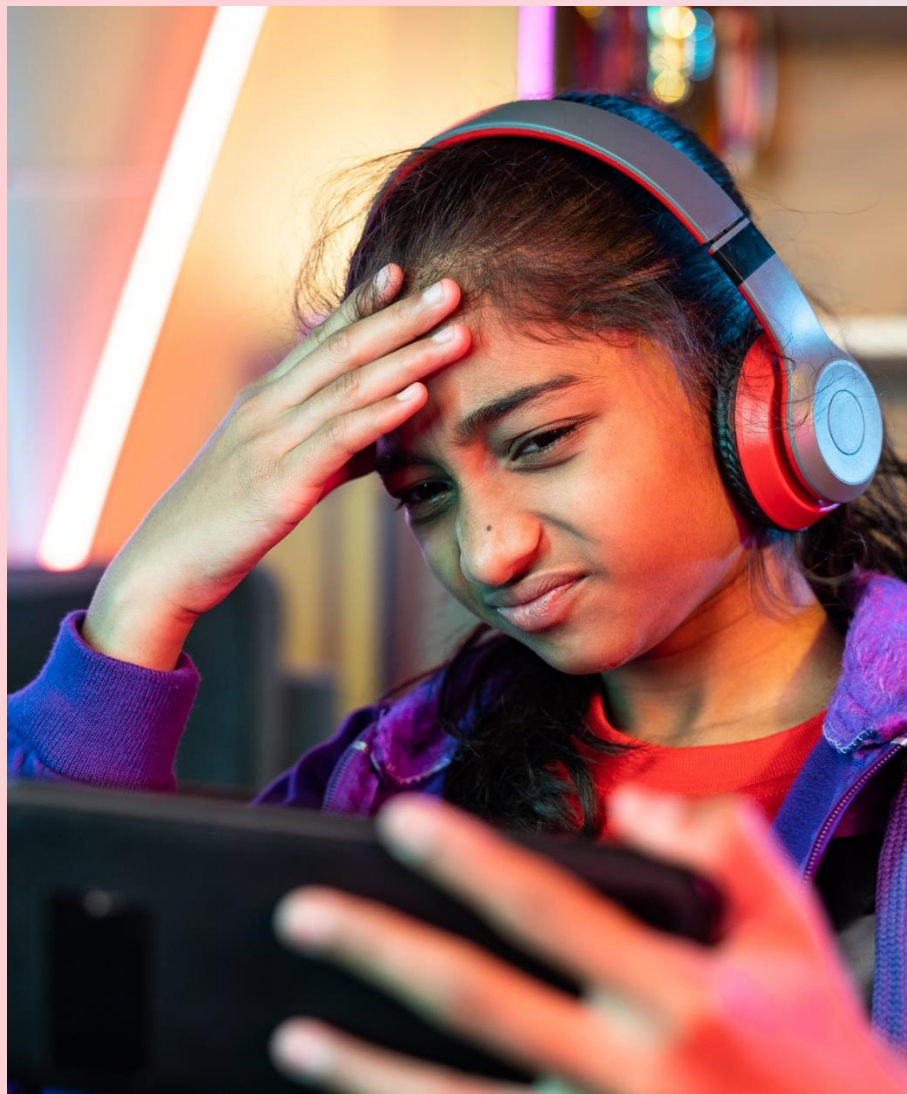
Let's look at the **three big ideas** being talked about this year...

However, it's **harder** than ever to **be informed** and **find the facts** about what is **really going on** in the world.

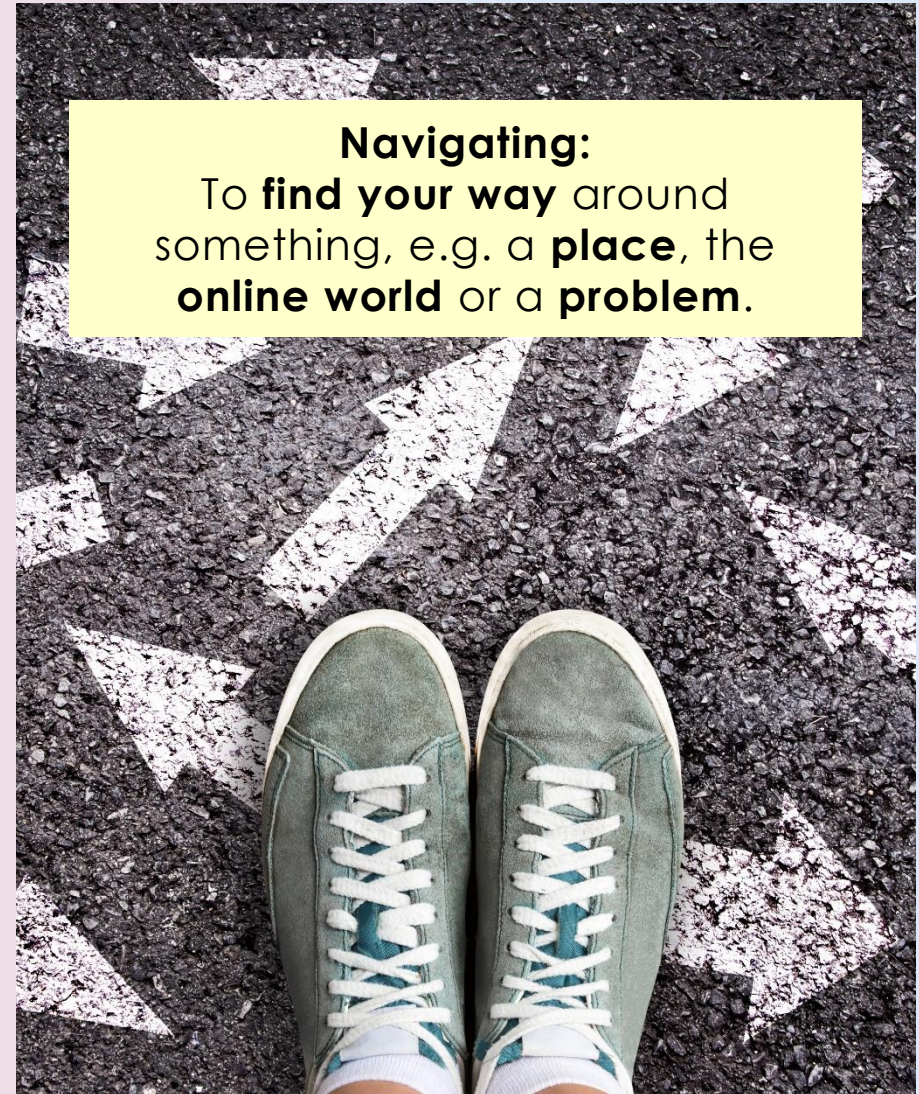
Fact vs fiction...

Go on a **news website that you trust** to compare the **facts** of the story. **Speak to an adult** if you are still unsure.

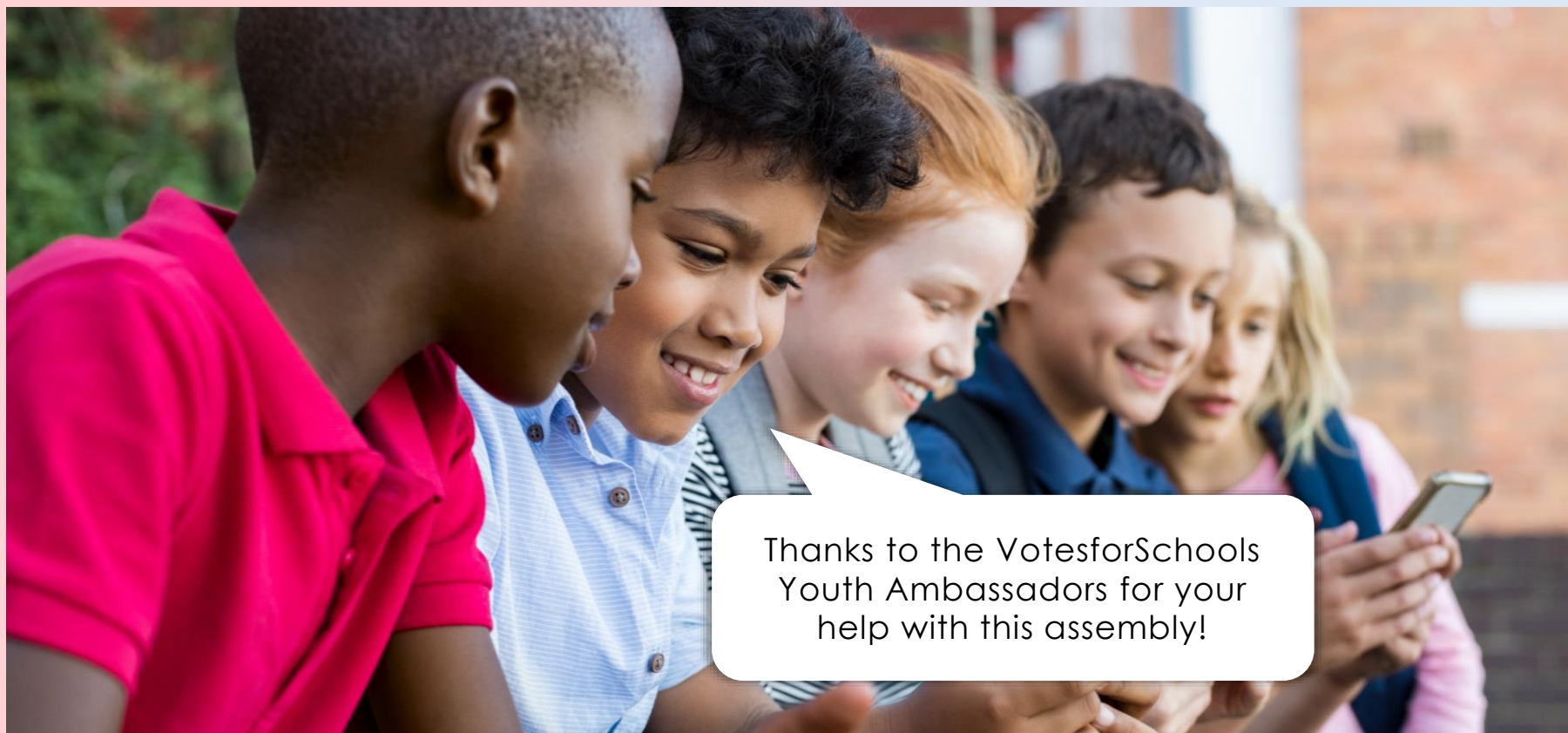
