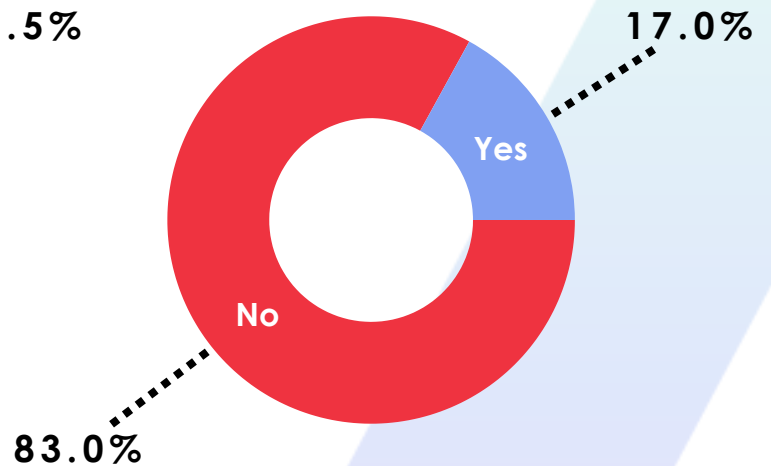
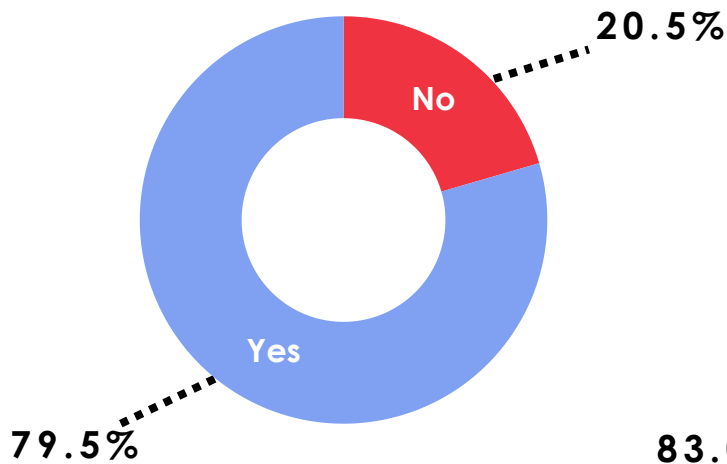

## A CLOSER LOOK: WHAT ARE COOKIES?



Do you ever find it confusing when adults talk about cookies on websites? They're not actually talking about sweet treats, but an online tool that helps websites to remember what you look at on the internet.

Like all technological tools, this can be helpful and harmful. Cookies help websites to make your online experience run more smoothly. For example, if you visit a website that uses cookies, it will remember your username for you. If you're doing some online shopping, the website uses cookies to remember what you have chosen to buy.

On the other hand, some websites use cookies to share information about what you have been looking at with businesses. These are called "third-party cookies". If you don't want your information being shared, there are ways that you can prevent it on your internet browser and on each website that you use.

The Government in Northern Ireland will be re-opened after a 23-month break. The Democratic Unionist Party has come to an agreement about some of the laws about Northern Ireland buying and selling things to the EU after Brexit.

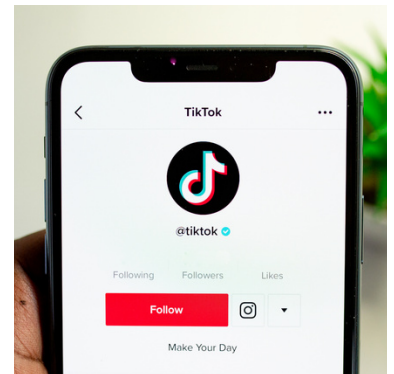
### **Disposable vapes to be banned**
