



Safer Internet Day 2024 is taking place on 6<sup>th</sup> February.


This event happens every year and helps us to think about how we can use the internet safely.








Older people grew up



#### Did you know?

5G is the fifth generation (version) of a mobile phone technology. It follows on from 3G and 4G.









#### Individual activity (5-10 mins)

Over the next few slides, you will read some different scenarios. For each one, think about whether something similar ever happened to you. If it has, use your fingers to type on an imaginary keyboard. If it hasn't, put your hands in your lap.



#### Did you know?

Make sure your passwords are easy to remember but hard to guess. Choosing four random words is a good strategy, like PencilSpatulaGorillaNeptune.

"Each week in computing, I find it tricky to log in. My username and password can be hard to remember, so my teacher gives me reminders."



Has something similar ever happened to you?

"At the weekend, I video called my grandad for the first time. He thought I was a photo on the screen and not a live video."



#### Did you know?

Some apps are designed for older people. This might be because of what's on the app or the data that is stored on users.

"I started using an app that had an age rating on. My brother reminded me that apps have ratings for a reason and that I should wait until I'm older to use it."

"Mr Bartlett was finding it hard to debug some code on Scratch. I use the programme a lot, so I helped him."

"Me and my friends were arguing about a game we were playing online. My Dads told me that I need to think about the way I speak to my friends."

working out how to use an app




Other times, people need help navigating the social side of the online world. This can include...

blocking and watching out being kind reporting people for scams online not sharing personal only chatting with friends identifying information fake news


