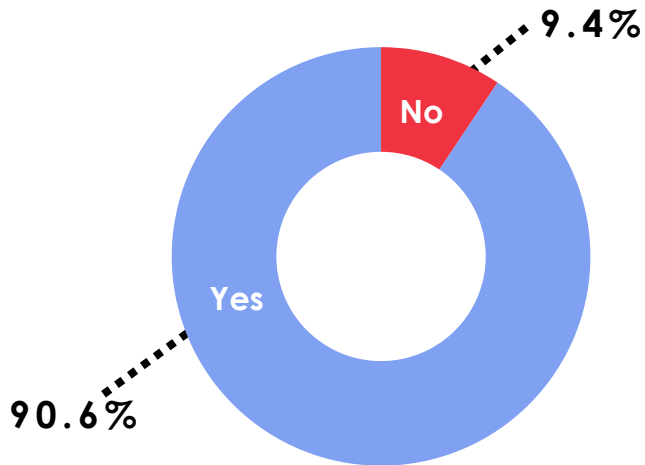
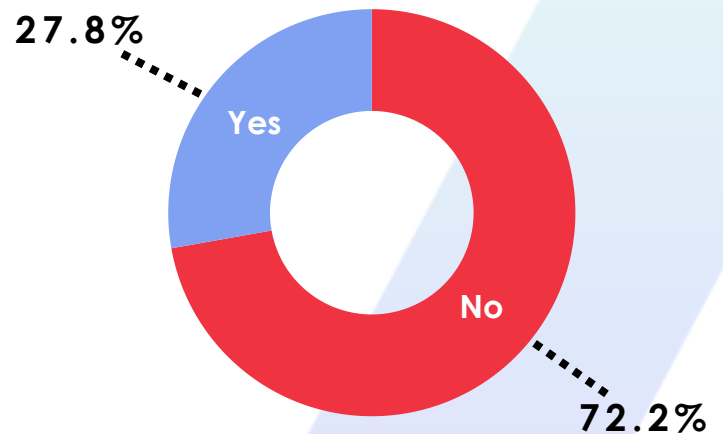

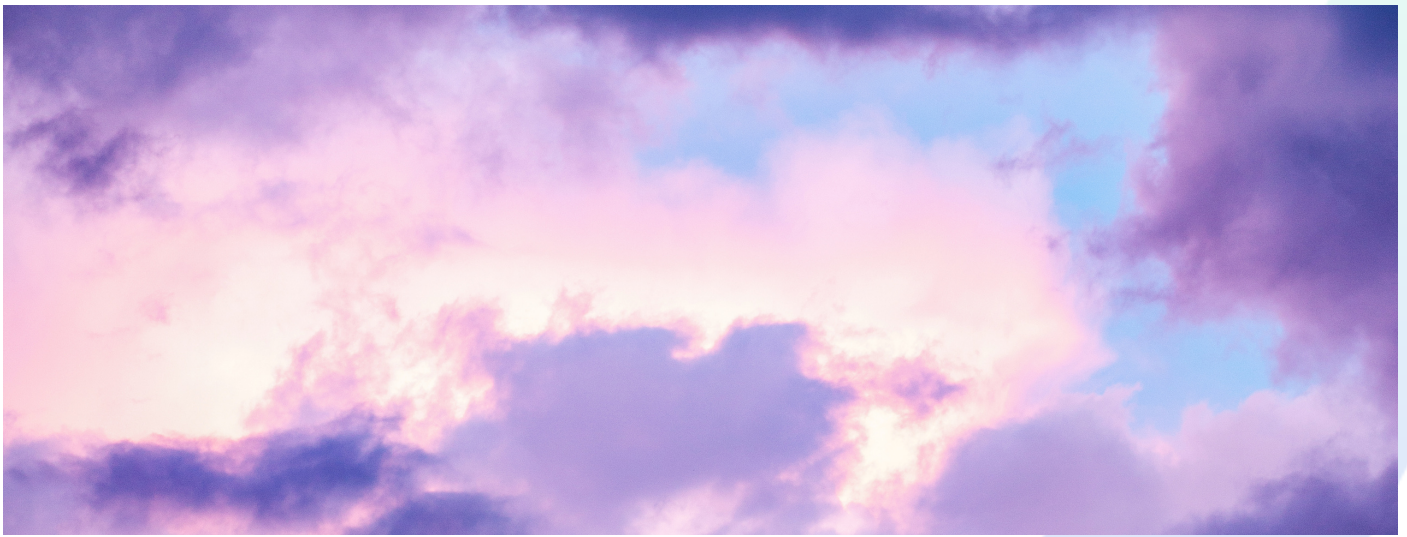
Would you know how to support a friend if someone important to them died?

Children's Grief Awareness Week was started in 2015 by Grief Encounter and the Childhood Bereavement Network to raise awareness of the bereavement experiences of children and young people, as well as the support they are getting.

Children's Grief Awareness Week 2023 is from 16th-23rd November. This is around the same time as International Children's Grief Awareness Day, which is always the Thursday before Thanksgiving in the United States.

One of the ways that schools can mark Children's Grief Awareness Week is by organising a "Go Purple Day". This is a special day that helps to raise money for bereaved children and young people by dressing up, decorating, and donating. Some people fundraise by wearing a purple item of clothing, decorating their classroom purple, and holding a bake sale with purple cakes!

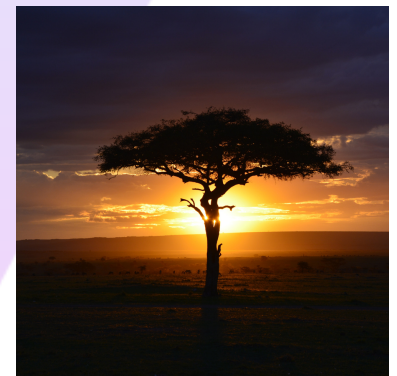
A cabinet comeback for Cameron

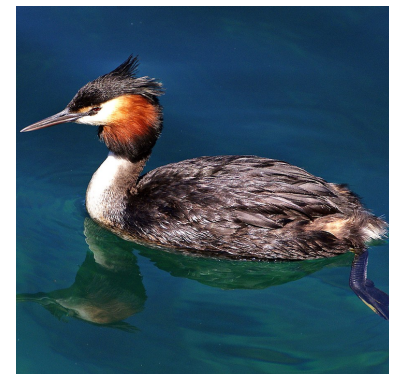
National holiday takes root
