I am used by someone who is trying to **find criminals**. I help them to **check large areas quickly**.



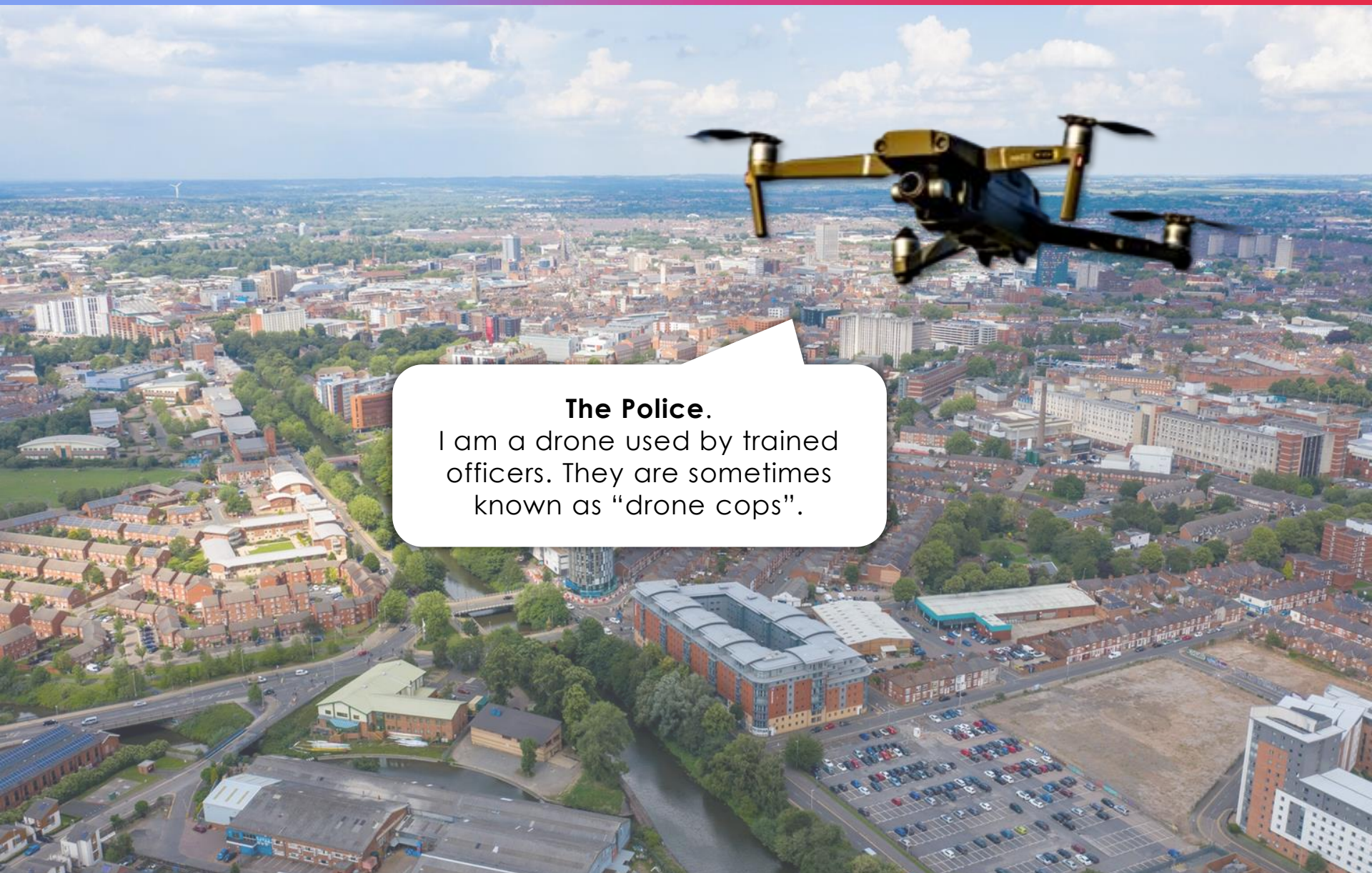

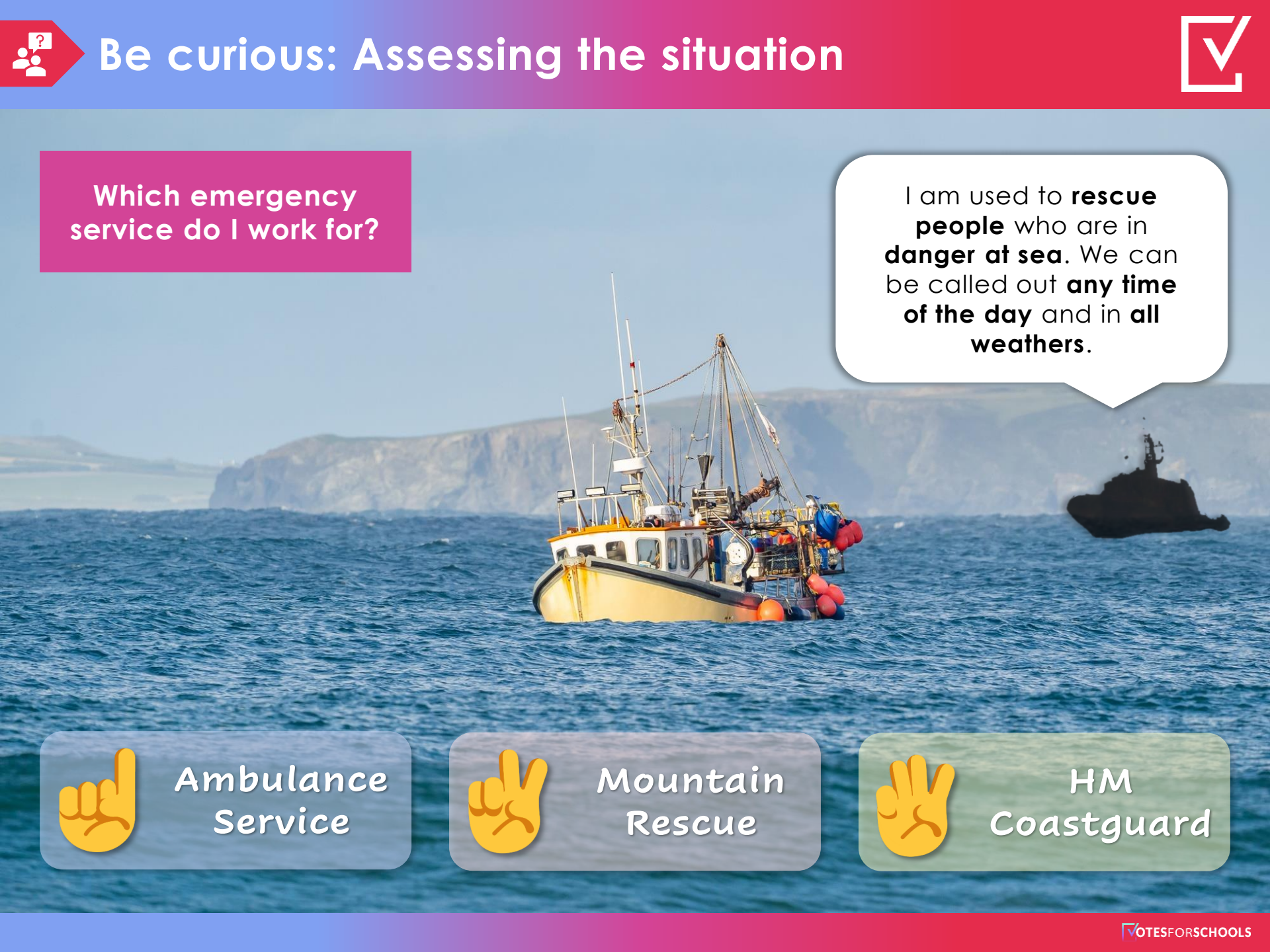


The Police.

Did you know?

HM Coastguard organise help for all 999 calls relating to the sea. They might call a coastguard helicopter, coastguard rescue teams or an RNLI Lifeboat.

I am used to help get **patients to hospital quickly**. The crew are **highly trained** so they can give people certain **medication on board**.

The Ambulance Service.

I am an air ambulance.
The crew is made up of
three people: one pilot
and two paramedics or
flight doctors.

Paramedic:

A person who is trained to provide medical
help, especially in an emergency.



Which emergency service do I work for?



I connect 999 calls to **call handlers**. They **collect details of the emergency** and **organise help**.

All of them!
I am a headset. All 999 calls will be answered by a call handler.



Which emergency service do I work for?

I help **rescuers** search **land and riverbanks** to find **lost or injured walkers** and get them to **safety**.

Mountain Rescue team members are all volunteers.

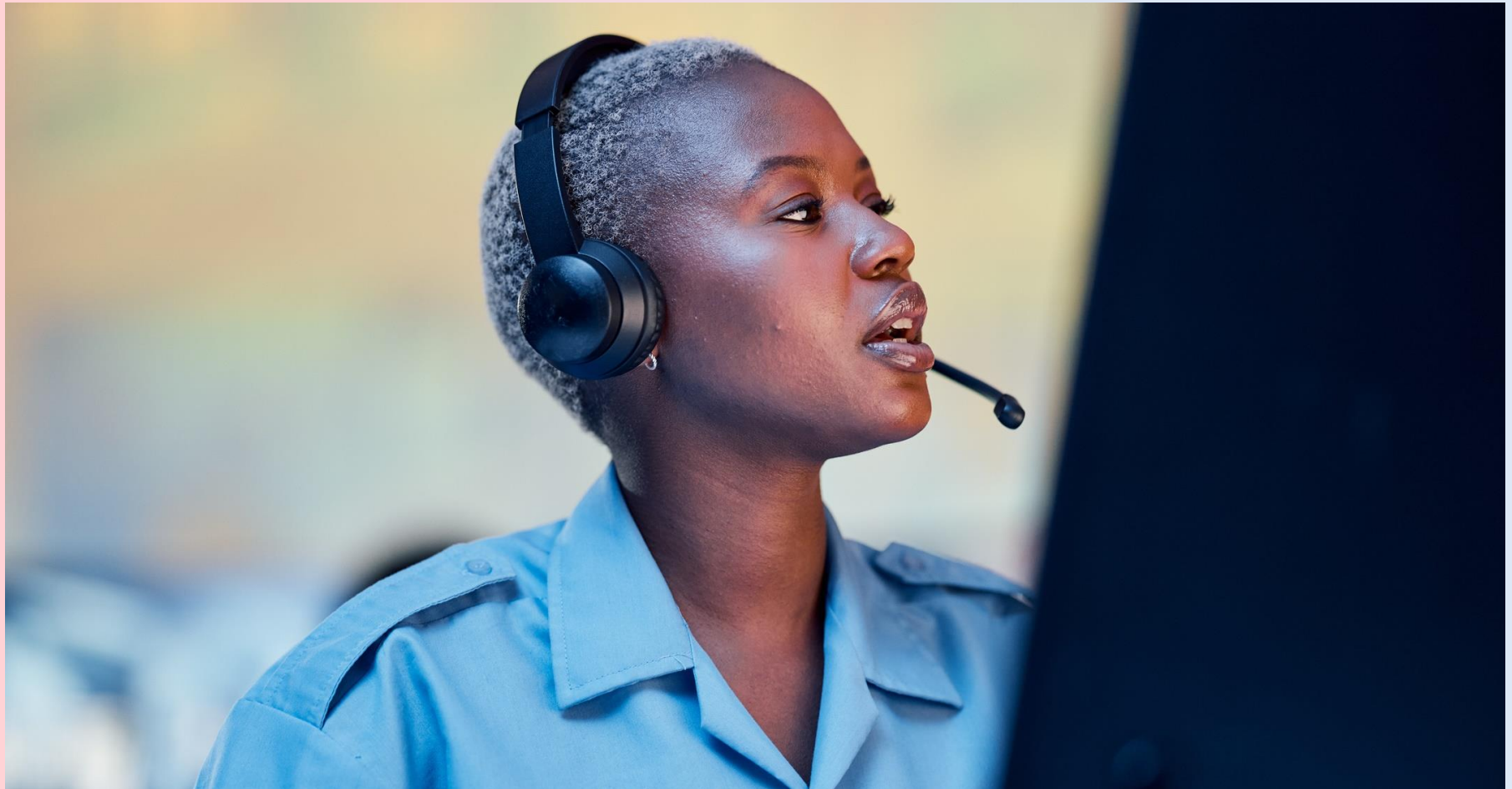
Did you know?

Mountain rescue also help animals who are stuck in places that are hard to get to.

Be heard: Who you gonna call?



In **an emergency**, you can call **999** and the emergency services needed will **come and help**.



Be heard: Who you gonna call?



It can be helpful to remember the **LIONEL system** to know which **details** you will need to **tell the operator if you ever call 999**.





L – Location

Tell them **where** the emergency is.

Tell them **what** has happened.

Tell them **what** services you need. Fire?
Ambulance? Mountain rescue?

Tell them **how many** people are there.

Tell them **how badly** people are hurt.

Tell them **where** the emergency is.



It's important that the **emergency services are only contacted in an emergency**. This could be if someone is **seriously ill or injured**, or a **crime is taking place**.
