Does money make up for injustice?

Justice: Fairness in the way people are treated.



Injustice: A situation in which there is not fairness or justice.

In the UK, the courts and judges make sure that everyone is treated fairly and lives by the country's laws.

Law: The system of official rules in the country.



In recent years, many Post Office workers, known as subpostmasters, have faced injustice because they were blamed for money going missing.



Most of them lost their jobs and some of them went to prison for stealing. Not many people listened to them when they said that they had not stolen anything.

It turned out that **computers** had been making **mistakes** and **subpostmasters** had **not** been stealing any money.

The people it affected are very **upset** and **angry**.

3 Why are we talking about this?





In the last few weeks, people have been watching a TV show on ITV called Mr. Bates vs The Post Office. This has raised awareness of the unfair treatment of the subpostmasters and the impact it had on their lives.



The Post Office have given some people money to say sorry for the unfair treatment they received. This is called compensation.

But some people don't think this makes up for the injustice of people losing their jobs and going to jail.

The boss of the Post Office has been **meeting subpostmasters across the country** to say sorry and hear their stories.

So far, **93 people** who went to prison or lost their job for stealing from the Post Office have **now been found not guilty**.

Did you know? The Government has put a plan together to make it easier for subpostmasters to say they are not guilty.
