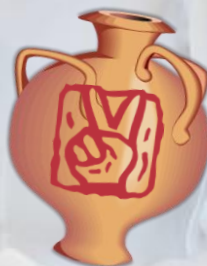

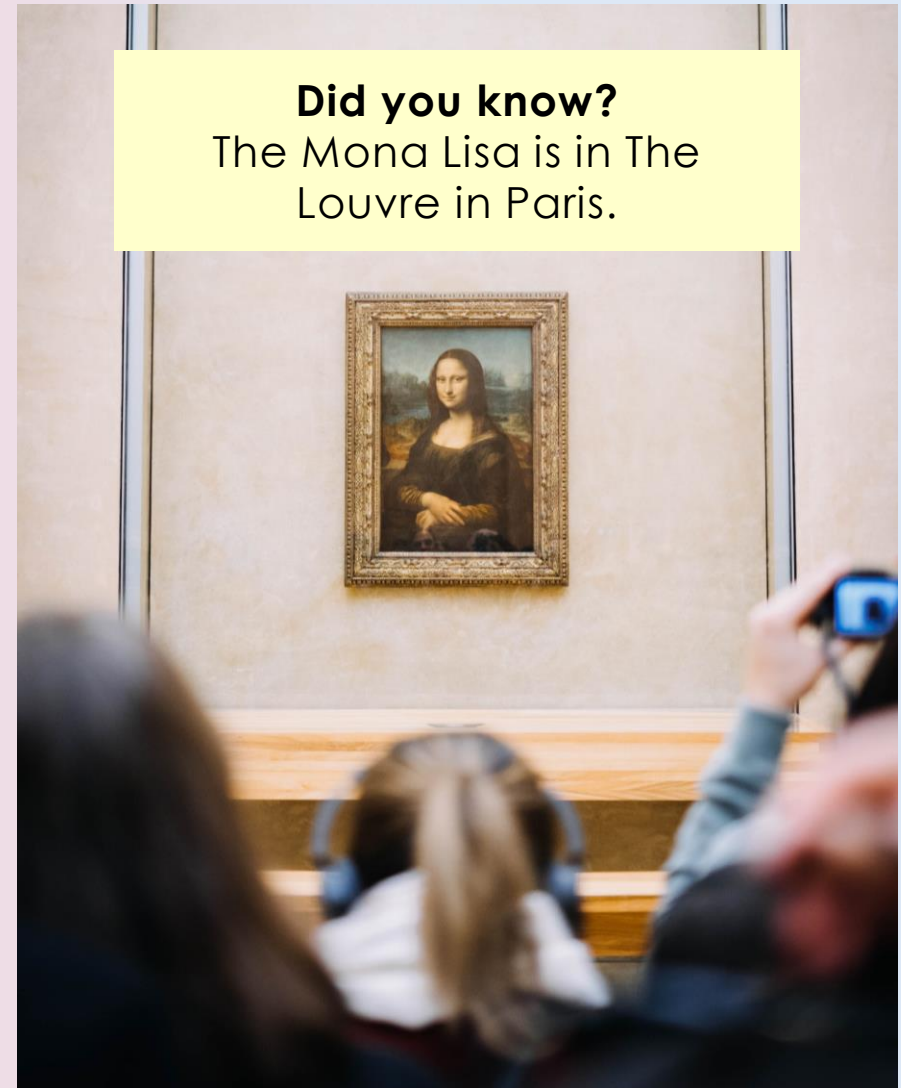

The website **Google Arts & Culture** (artsandculture.google.com) has many exhibitions online for you to explore, you can even tour round some famous museums digitally!



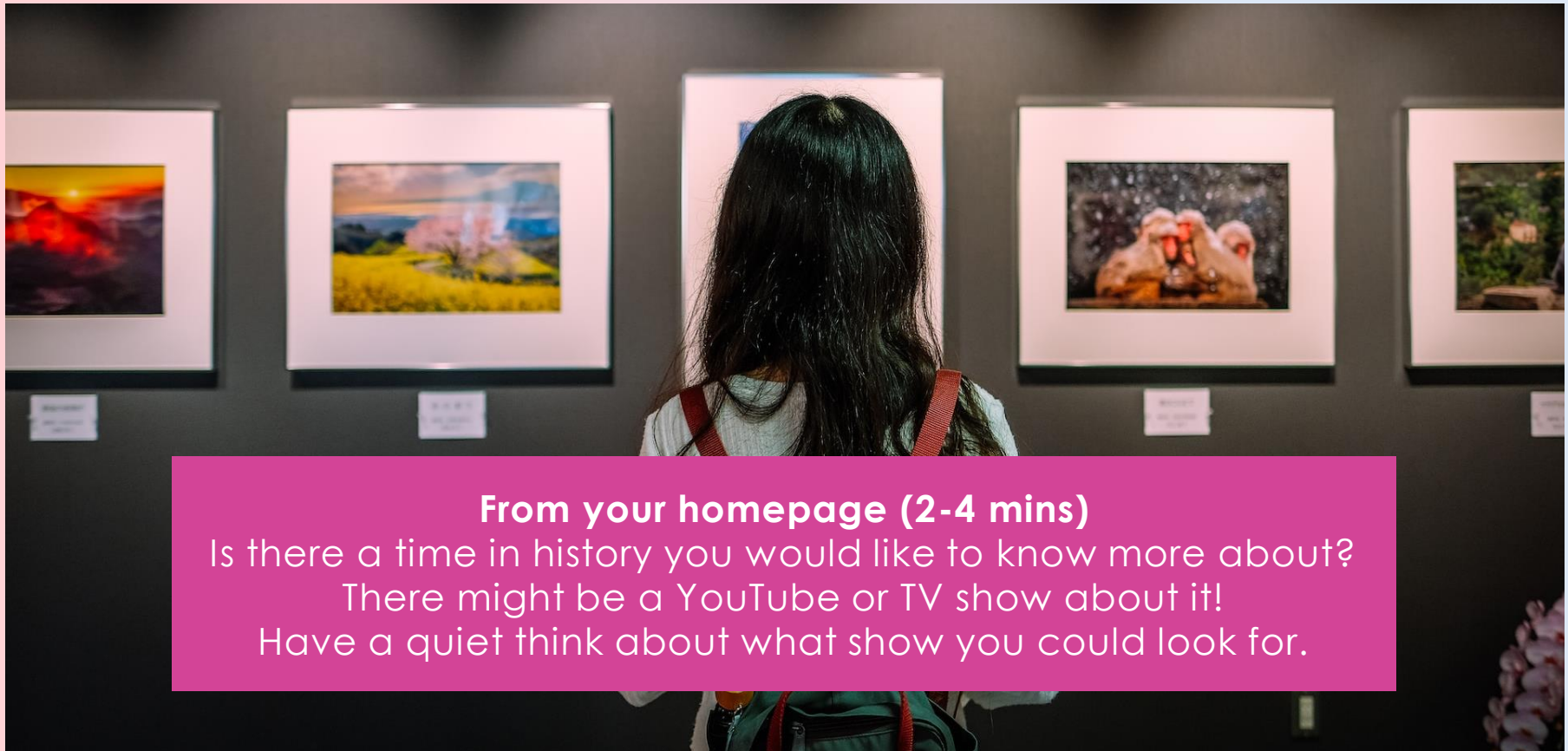


Be heard: Walking through history
