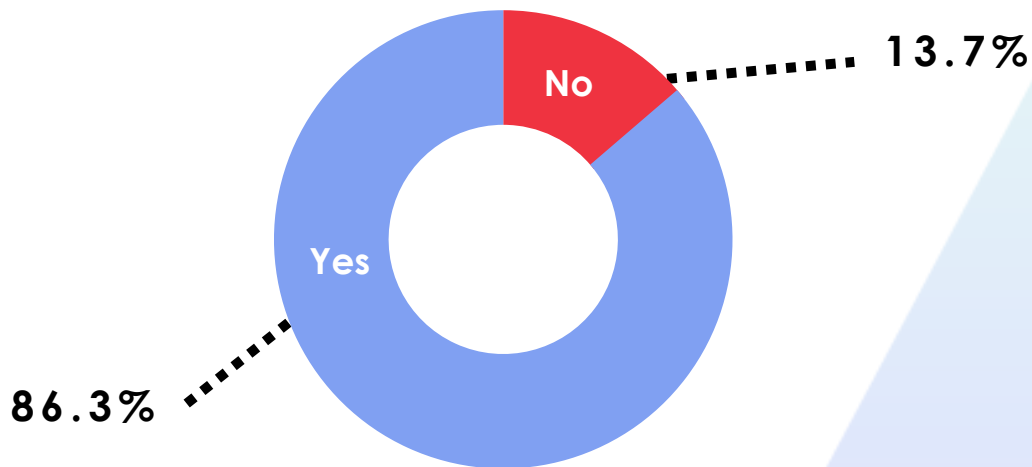

A CLOSER LOOK: TUTANKHAMUN



The year is 1922. Howard Carter and a group of Egyptian workers discover one of the most sensational treasures of the 20th century: Tutankhamun's tomb.

It was a stroke of luck that led them to the tomb, deep in the Valley of Kings in Egypt. A young worker uncovered a hidden step, carved in the rock. It led to an underground passage and then to a sealed doorway. Behind this, they finally found the tomb of the Pharaoh Tutankhamun.

Surprisingly, the tomb had been untouched for over 3,000 years. Howard Carter spent the next 10 years removing precious objects from the tomb. These included a splendid gold mask, chairs, jewellery, paintings, and even jars that contained human organs. Today, these treasures all remain in Egypt, the place where they were made.
